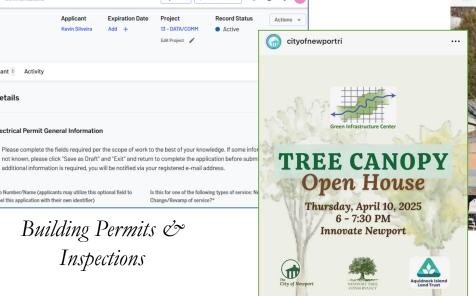

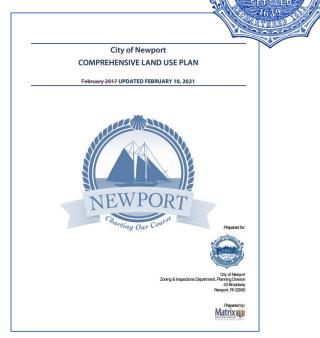

Achievements 2024-2025, Housing

 Short Term Rental Supervisor researched, selected and launched new software to manage registrations and support improved compliance for STRs.

An RI APA Award for 2025 was awarded for the City of Newport's Housing Buildout

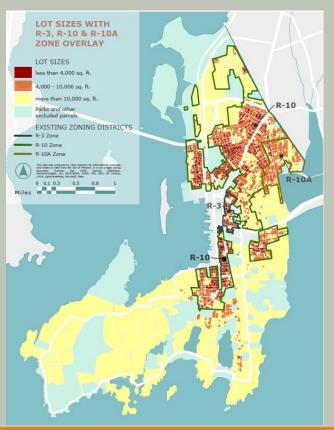
Analysis and Housing Chapter.

 A State technical assistance grant was awarded to the Department for a full-time Housing Fellow.

 The Preservation Planner, working with the NRF, was awarded a CLG grant to address lead issues and promote preservation.











Achievements 2024-2025, Resiliency

- The City's planners participate in regional planning and resiliency efforts, and meet regularly with planners from Middletown, Portsmouth, the Naval Base, and Paige Myatt with the Aquidneck Land Trust. They also visited with planners from other island communities to learn about how they are mitigating the effects of climate change.
- Aquidneck Island received a NOAA grant for almost \$2 million for increased capacity for regional resilience planning through Aquidneck Land Trust.
- The Aquidneck Island Regional Hazard Mitigation Plan, a first of a kind, is awaiting approval from RIEMA and FEMA and will support both local and island wide hazard mitigation measures.
- Two RIIB grants, Pine Street and King Park are in progress. Pine Street will be completed this fall.

Achievements 2024-2025, Boards and Commissions

- A significant amount of updates and changes to the zoning code were written and presented to the council. Newport is a leader in the state with the adoption of state enabling zoning legislation in our local zoning code.
- The Preservation Planner processed 255 HDC applications in 2024; and the Zoning Officer processed 144 ZBR applications. The Planning Board, HDC and ZBR are all up to date with State and local regulations and are hearing current applications. The ZBR has eliminated a 12 month backlog!
- The Zoning application process is now completely on line, and HDC and Planning will soon follow.



In the coming year, we are looking forward to completing the mandatory 10-year Comprehensive Plan Update. (Deadline: 2027)

Why does it matter?

- Protection of public health, safety, and welfare in changing frequency and intensity of extreme weather and other stress events
- Consider short- and long-term cost of doing nothing, tipping points for action, and return on investments
- Advance municipal projects through partnerships and collaboration among departmental expertise for implementable solutions



Key Elements of Rhode Island's Climate Action Strategy

Energy Efficiency	We will make sure that our homes, buildlings, and transportation use energy as efficiently as possible so we need less.
Transition Away from Fossil Fuel	We will transition our buildings, vehicles, businesses, and manufacturing away from using oil and gas and towards electricity and alternative fuels.
Green our Energy Supply	We will produce energy from sources like wind and solar to make sure that when we transition to electric power it will be clean.
Remove Carbon from the Air	We will conserve open space and forests, plant more trees, and support agriculture so that carbon will be stored in plants and soil.
Just Transition	We will help the community to make a just transition to a new energy system by supporting workers to learn new trades, making streets safer for multiple forms of transportation, addressing needs around transit, food, and public green spaces, and supporting local climate resilience plans.

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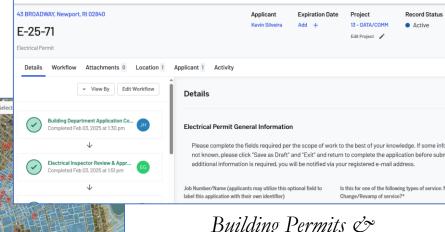

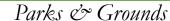
